Panelists

Dr. Taehyun KIM is the director of the Center for the Study of Grand Strategy, and professor of international relations at Chung-Ang University in South Korea. Before joining Chung-Ang University in 1998, he was a visiting assistant professor at University of Florida at Gainesville, Merriam Fellow at University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign, and a senior fellow and director for foreign policy and security studies program at the Sejong Institute. He was also a visiting scholar at the Mershon Center for International Security at Ohio State University for several periods, and visiting professor at the Sam Nunn School of International Affairs at the Georgia Institute of Technology. He has written scores of articles, both in English and Korea, related to international relations theory, foreign policy analysis, inter-Korean relations, international relations in East Asia, and other international security issues.

Cyril KOZACZEWSKI is the ambassador extraordinary and plenipotentiary of the Republic of Poland to Japan. Kozaczewski started his career at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in 1995. From 1996 to 1997 he was attaché at the Embassy of Seoul and from 1997 to 2000 he was working at the department of Security Policy at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Afterwards he was the First Secretary of the Permanent Representation of Poland to the NATO headquarter in Brussels. From 2005 to 2007 Kozaczewski worked as the Head of Division at the Department of Security Policy at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Afterwards he was deputy director at the Department of the European Union at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Before he became ambassador he was the political director for EU affairs and director of the Department of Common Foreign and Security Policy at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

Ukeru MAGOSAKI, is a critic and commentator on Japanese foreign relations, lecturer at the Graduate School of Josai International University and member of the executive board of the East Asian Community Institute. A former Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary for Japan to Uzbekistan (1999-2002) and Iran (1993-1996), he has also worked at the Department for International Intelligence at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Japan (1997-1999). From 2002 to 2009, he was a professor at the National Defense Academy of Japan. He is author of numerous books on Japanese foreign and security policy,

such as the recently published "Nihon no jōhō to gaikō" (Japan's foreign policy and information strategy", 2013) and "Nichibei dōmei no shōtai" (The Truth about the Japanese-American Alliance, 2013).

Dr. Gudrun E. WACKER is Senior Fellow of the Asia Division at the German Institute for International and Security Affairs where she was the head of the Division before. From 1992 to 2000 she was a Research Fellow at the Federal Institute for Russian, East European and International Studies. From 1983 on Gudrun Wacker was member of the academic and teaching staff at the Institute for Chinese and Korean Studies at the Eberhard-Karls-University in Tuebingen. Her main fields of research are Chinese foreign and security policy, China's domestic development and security arrangements in the Asia Pacific Region.

Chair

Dr. Sven SAALER is Associate Professor of Modern Japanese History at Sophia University and representative of the Friedrich-Ebert-Stiftung in Tokyo. He was formerly Head of the Humanities Section of the German Institute for Japanese Studies (DIJ) and Associate Professor at The University of Tokyo. He has written a monograph on history debates in Japan (*Politics, Memory and Public Opinion*, 2005) and articles on the history textbook controversy, the Yasukuni question and the historical development and significance of Pan-Asianism. Together with J. Victor Koschmann, he has edited *Pan-Asianism in Modern Japanese History* (Routledge, 2007), with Wolfgang Schwentker *The Power of Memory in Modern Japan* (Global Oriental, 2008) and with Christopher W. A. Szpilman *Pan-Asianism: A Documentary History* (Rowman & Littlefield, 2011).
